4. India Center: Building Committee Report

Latest reports on COVID-19 in USA show a rise again in the number of cases. But the good news is that COVID's severity has diminished considerably for immunized and boosted individuals. Taking advantage of diminished severity, our community members have attended a variety of in-person programs offered by ICRCC. These programs are discussed in more details elsewhere in this newsletter.

In the meantime, using the grant received from NY State, we have improved the 'stage' in the main hall. The 'stage' is much sturdier; its carpet has been replaced by engineered wood, and is much better suited for all activities, in particular for dance performances.

As an organization we are always frugal in spending money, including towards building Improvements. Thanks to few dedicated members of the community and the board, we are able to save thousands of dollars in labor costs; fixing the 'stage' is one such activity. We aim to use the limited amount allocated for building improvements for maximum impact. Our next improvement project will be to improve the rooms downstairs – an idea that has been discussed in earlier newsletters. This project is potentially feasible using the remainder of NY grant money but requires additional financial support from the community members.

The building is OURS. Please suggest ideas and participate in efforts to improve the same.

5. Update on ICRCC Activities Supported by of NYSCA grant

As mentioned previously, ICRCC received a \$16k grant from New York State Council on the Arts (NYSCA) which was a result of a very comprehensive, thorough and lengthy process of writing a proposal by our dedicated and determined board members. But this was just the start. What followed thereafter was the detailed planning to create a formal program of the cultural and arts classes to be offered at the India Center at a very nominal price.

We were lucky to be able to recruit some very talented local artists to offer these classes. The planned classes are: Sewing (Navitika Patel), Bollywood Dance (Kajal Sharma), Bollywood & Kathak Fusion (Seema Sureshkumar), Mehndi (Pinal Patel), Art & Craft (Charvi Nanavati), and Bharatnatyam (Dr. Sudha Raj), We are also considering Yoga classes.

As noted in the Building Committee report, the grant is helping us to create the perfect dance floor for our next cultural event!

Some classes are already over, some are underway and others are still coming up. Due to this undertaking, our India Center is buzzing with activities these days. We are very thankful to all the instructors and participants for their cooperation and enthusiasm to support this undertaking.

Classical Music Concert "Sangeet Sandhya" by MIT Shruti group

On June 4, 2022, ICRCC hosted our first in-person music event this year at the India Center, a well-attended classical music performance by a group from MIT (Cambridge, MA), consisting of the following:

- Vinayak Agarwal, from Ajmer, learnt music from Pt. Devendra Mishra of the Maihar Gharana, with a special focus on the Nikhil Banerjee style of instrumental playing. He played a unique instrument: the Mohan-Veena (invented by Pt. Vishwa Mohan Bhatt), a modified Hawaiian guitar with 3-4 melody strings, 4-5 drone strings, and 12 sympathetic strings, and a gourd for resonance.
- Ameya Rao, a Hindustani vocalist from California, learnt music from Shri Nachiketa Yakkundi, a disciple of Pt. Basavaraj Rajguru of the Kirana Gharana.
- Devosmita Sen, a Hindustani vocalist from Mumbai, learnt from her father Dr. Debasis Sen, Shri Bhudev Mishra, Pt. Paresh Jana (a disciple of Ustad Nisar Hussain Khan), and Pt. Samaresh Chawdhury.
- Arjav Shah, a Hindustani vocalist from Surat, learnt music from Shri. Bhagwati Prasad Gandharva, Smt. Heena Dave and Shri Sunil Modi.
- Soor Vora, a Carnatic and Hindustani vocalist from Syracuse, learnt music from Smt. Jaishree Raman, Smt. Rekha Balaji, and currently studies with Smt. Sandhya Sridhar.
- Sugandha Sharma was another important member of the group, who ably handled the logistics and coordination of pre-recorded accompaniments.

They performed several ragas, including Yaman ("devana deva mahadev") and Desh ("aye anokhe khelaiyaa"), ending with Bhairavi ("baaju band khul khul jaaye") and a semi-classical Bollywood song in Darbari Kanada ("satyam shivam sundaram"). An interesting feature was a nicely melded rendering of raga[m] Hamsadhwani in both Hindustani ("laagi lagan") and Carnatic styles ("vaataapi gaNapatim bhajE")¹, bringing out the similarities and subtle differences in both musical styles.

The performance had great energy, and it was clear that these young people loved music and coordinated very well with each other, interspersing segments by different performers, each bringing their own unique style and skills, and bringing out the best in each other. About 65 people attended the concert and enjoyed the exceptional musical talents of the performers.

Each piece performed was greatly appreciated by all – we look forward to more such events at the India Center in the near future.

Dr. Tarakad Ramachandran, 72, passed away peacefully on October 9, 2020, surrounded by his family. He was very well respected and accomplished teacher and neurologist, who was affiliated with multiple hospitals in the area.
